Best Practice -01

1. Title of practice: State Level- Shri Dyaneshwar Trophy Intercollegiate Elocution Competition.

2. Goals:

- Enhance interest about current issues as well as Saint Literature.
- Develop Communication skill and confidence of expression among students.
- Develop critical thinking, analytical view and enhance reading habits among the students.
- Offer a platform for the youth and offer an opportunity for interaction

3. The Context:

Newasa is a great seat of learning as the first Marathi interpretation of Bhagwadgita, Shri Dnyaneshwari was written in 12th century at Newasa. The college was established with the encouragement of Late Honourable Yashwantraoji Chavan for enabling the rural youth. The impact of Saint Literature is significant on the people of Maharashtra with the intention of enabling students to take cognizance of the rich heritage as well as of the current social issues this state level elocution competition was introduced 42 years ago. The tradition of this competition is continued for this long period enthusiastically as the response is very positive.

Similar elocution and debating competitions namely Hiwale Trophy at Ahmednagar of Sharada Karandak/ Trophy have ceased. Today winning the Shri Dnyaneshwar Trophy Elocution Competition has become a 'Prestige Point for participants aspiring students over the state.

4. The Practice:

Mostly the State Level- Shri Dyaneshwar Trophy Intercollegiate Elocution Competition is held in September/October. The subject of the competition are of two categories **Group A** focuses on quotation from the great Saint literature (from St. Dnyaneshwar, St. Namdev, St. Tukaram, St. Bahinabai, St. Kabir, St. Gadge Maharaj etc.) **Group B** consists of the topic from current social issues and problems (such as inclusive society, caesium, equal opportunity, women empowerment, jobs, student's role in politics, moral sensorship, freedom of expression, basic human rights, environment global warming, liberalization etc.)

Brochures are sent to colleges all over Maharashtra and to the universities. Team entries are invited after formal inauguration as per the regulations of the competition every contestant is given 10 minute time. Three/ four examiners assess the performance. The best scoring team wins the trophy. The process is impartial as scholars from intellectual community such as Professors, journalists, scholars from spiritual studies are appointed for the job.

Winners of the trophy can keep the trophy with them for a year and then submit it to the college for next competition.

1. Title of practice: Workshop on Language Learning and Teaching for Teachers.

3. The Context:

The college is in rural area most of the students are from farming sector. They complete their secondary and higher secondary education in the nearby villages.
